All.together Campus Ministry is about to be four years old, and we want to thank you, the Southeast Michigan Synod, for supporting us every step of the way. We can honestly say that we would not be where we are today without the support of the Synod, local churches, individual donors, and volunteers. And where are we exactly? Well, we have cultivated a vibrant community of faith for the students, staff and faculty of Wayne State University, Henry Ford College, and the University of Michigan-Dearborn. We started from scratch in 2021 in the midst of the Covid-19 pandemic, but by the grace of God, in this fourth year we honored our first full graduating class of eight students, some of whom have been members of this ministry since they were in their freshman year of college.

These students are a sign and a source of hope in turbulent times. And while I'd like to say just how important we are in the lives of these students, it is not just them who need us, but we who need them. The church is incomplete without their voice and leadership, and we wouldn't be able to accompany students the way we do without your support, so thank you. New, young, and diverse student leaders are not just the future of our church, but because of the work that we are able to do on campus on behalf of our Synod, these are students who lead now in our church and our world.

Our presence on campus in Dearborn and Detroit means that we can continue to have a mutually positive impact on students like Joshua (they/he). I met Joshua at the FestiFall Involvement Fair at Wayne State and they had visited our table and provided us with their email address. I followed up promptly, as I always do, with an invite to get coffee or lunch, and Joshua replied quickly. We got a date on the calendar to meet before classes even started.

When Joshua arrived at the coffee shop, he seemed nervous. After we ordered, we sat down and began introducing ourselves to each other, but as we went along, we became more comfortable with each other and before too long, Joshua had shared how they were effectively homeless for the year prior to arriving at Wayne State. You see, Joshua had been raised in a conservative fundamentalist Christian household and he separated from his family because they would not accept his queer identity. He eventually found himself

in Milwaukee, Wisconsin where he couch surfed and also became involved in an ELCA Church Plant called Zao MKE. Because of that experience of welcome and support from Zao, Joshua gave our ELCA/Episcopal campus ministry a chance.

Ever since that first meeting, All.together has been able to accompany Joshua through this semester providing for them a community to connect to, a network of wider church resources to plug into for financial assistance, a \$500 All.together mutual aid grant, and some food over the winter break for when he was living in the dorms and the dining hall was closed.

In Joshua's own words, "I met Pastor Ben at the beginning of my first semester at Wayne State University. I came in as a fifth year transfer student who didn't know anyone in Michigan. Pastor Ben helped me feel comfortable attending the ministry's weekly meetings where I made a few friends who have all supported me physically and emotionally while I work on finishing my last two years of undergrad. All.together has been one of a handful of communal spaces where I can feel safe and welcome."



## Zoē Oakland

Zoē Oakland was birthed from a question: "What could happen if North Oakland County congregations pooled our energy to engage in mission beyond our collective walls? What might we do together?"

Two and half years later, we have been blessed by the financial and volunteer support of ELCA congregations in Rochester Hills, Lake Orion, Clarkston, Waterford, Bloomfield Hills, West Bloomfield, and Shelby Township. With their support, we have begun to engage students and young adults at Oakland University and Rochester Christian University, most of whom are disconnected from church and faith.

The word "zoē" is a Greek word that means life. But not just any kind of life – the true, full, abundant life that Jesus came to bring. In John 10:10, Jesus said, "I have come that they would have life, and life to full." That is what we want students and young adults to experience with Zoē Oakland.





Meredith never imagined she'd rediscover faith after years as an atheist. A painful loss in her life stirred questions she couldn't ignore, and when Pastor Eric invited her to Zoē Oakland, she decided to give it a try. "It just seemed like something good for me to do," she says. What began as a casual step turned into a journey of transformation.

Zoē's emphasis on service and community drew Meredith in immediately. She loved the chance to volunteer and to brainstorm ways to impact the world with like-minded peers.

But it was the honest, open conversations that changed her most. "Through talking with Pastor Eric, I've been able to process my doubts and struggles, and it's given me hope." Meredith has found that faith isn't about having all the answers but embracing a journey. For her, Zoē is a beacon of what living out faith looks like: action rooted in love and connection.



Led by Rev. Eric Johnson, who serves as the mission developer for Zoē Oakland and pastor of King of Kings Lutheran Church in Lake Orion, Zoē Oakland has a presence at Oakland University and Rochester Christian University. It plans to launch ministry at Oakland Community College and engage young adults not currently connected to an area college.

We are looking for congregational partners, board members, lay liaisons in congregations, and individual financial contributors to join our team and support the work of God amongst young adults and college students in Oakland County.
